We've all been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic at work and in our daily lives. During this unprecedented time, it's important to do our best to keep ourselves safe and healthy. Our everyday is changing, but one thing we can continue to focus on is our own health and wellness.

Aspirus Volunteers are extremely important to our success. You make a difference for our patients and visitors each day. Whether it is delivering flowers or a card to a patient at the hospital or holding the hand of a patient in Hospice, volunteers touch the lives of people in the community.

Here are just a few statistics on the services that Aspirus Volunteers provided this past year from January 2019 to December 2019: 402 adult volunteers and 63 teen volunteers donated over 48,644 hours representing a value of over \$1.23 million in contributed service!

A few ways that volunteers supported Aspirus Wausau Hospital

4,267 EZ Rider trips to deliver 6,584 people

158 Pet Therapy Visits

3,784 pieces of guest mail delivered

67 Hospice patients visited for a total of 1,862 hours

Teddy Bear Clinic program was hosted by 14 volunteers that provided 627 hours of service.

Rainbow's End Day Camp was supported by 567 volunteers that provided 2,607 hours so 63 campers could experience the camp.

Lifeline Medical Response is supported by 11 volunteers who install and service units in subscriber homes in Marathon county. In 2019, there were approximately 700 subscribers.

Handmade items such as baby caps, teddy bears, and prayer shawls created by Aspirus volunteers helped support patients and family members

The Aspirus Health Foundation community fundraising events supported programs for patients, families and our community.

In August 2019, volunteers shared their time and talents to help the 13th Annual Aspirus Women's Golf Classic raise \$87,000. This will help children and adult victims of sexual assault and abuse by supporting a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) program; support Reach Out and Read - a program used by 13 Aspirus Clinics to help kids build healthy brains; and helped create the Aspirus Family House for families in need of a place to stay during a medical crisis or when traveling for specialty care.

The Festival of Trees, a week-long event in November 2019, was another success because of the support of our community, donors, and over 200 volunteers who helped raise \$223,000 to support Aspirus Comfort Care and Hospice Services, including two community bedrooms at Aspirus Hospice House for patients with identified financial need.

Yes, our Aspirus Volunteers have been busy! I can't thank you enough for all your past help and I am praying for all of you and your safety until we can all be together again volunteering. Some people just make life better for everyone around them. That's how our Aspirus Volunteers are. Your kind hearts and generous souls have blessed so many people. System Wide Grand Rounds Canine Therapy in the Hospital Setting

On January 8, volunteers were invited to attend the presentation "Canine Therapy in the Hospital Setting". Brigitte Vanle, one of our pet therapy volunteers and a medical student, shared data from her research project on the subject. She was joined by Eileen Guthrie, pet therapy volunteer, and Deb Raatz who shared information on foundational behavioral training for therapy dogs and the Aspirus pet therapy program.



Reminder to all Volunteers - Confidentiality

Aspirus provides vital services in many communities, and a hospital plays a special role in small towns. It is important to remember that our first job as health care providers, staff and volunteers is to care for our patients and protect their right to privacy.

Anyone receiving care at an Aspirus facility can ask to be a "Privacy Patient". No information about privacy patients can be given out to callers or visitors – we cannot even acknowledge that we have a patient by that name.

On a normal day, people (including reporters) seeking information about a non-privacy patient may be given

an appropriate one-word condition report if they provide the patient's name. This information is provided by a Hospital Supervisor or a member of the Marketing & Communications team. Refer all information requests to the facility's communication leader.

Do not discuss patient information with anyone.

Do not tell friends, family or acquaintances about any patient in any way.

Do not discuss a patient's case, even with a colleague.

Do not read a chart or patient information.

Do not discuss patient information on social media.

Emergency Code Reminder - Weather Emergencies

With warmer weather finally approaching, so will the possibility of severe weather. Should a tornado watch be issued for the Wausau area, Aspirus will make an announcement over the speaker system stating "Severe Weather Alert Tornado Watch" and will include the end time of the watch. Staff will begin preparations in case a Tornado Warning is issued. In the event of a Tornado Warning, an announcement will be made over the speaker system stating "Severe Weather Alert Tornado Warning" and staff will instruct you where to go for shelter.

MCW Students Volunteering at Aspirus Wausau Hospital

Although the Medical College of Wisconsin-Central Wisconsin (MCW-CW) campus expanded and moved their classrooms across the street from the hospital, many of the students are participating in the Aspirus volunteer program. We currently have medical students volunteering with Lifeline, Pet Therapy, Palliative Care Unit, Medical Surgical Intensive Care Unit, Comfort Cart, Cardiac Rehab gym and Surgery waiting room. - Go to www.aspirus.org/volunteers
- Choose "Wausau Area"
- On the right side of the page you will find the section "For Current Volunteers", then click the "Volgistics Login" link.
- Enter your login name and password and click the Go button. Your login name is your email address on file and your password is your volunteer ID number (usually written on the back of your badge).

Public Policy Education

In the midst of Governor Tony Evers' Stay at Home Order designed to flatten the COVID-19 curve and protect Wisconsin citizens from the COVID

pandemic, federal and state legislatures are scrambling to write and enact legislation to ensure hospitals have the resources needed to continue operations. Hospitals are not only faced with a shortage of personal protective equipment (PPE), but also with soaring prices for PPE purchases. Hospitals are also faced with a shortage of testing supplies to identify COVID-19 patients.

As hospitals struggle to acquire these critical supplies, federal directives have required the cancelation of elective procedures resulting in significant revenue losses in Wisconsin, estimated to be \$170 million per week. These actions are being required to conserve PPE and ensure hospital bed capacity is available for a potential surge of patients with the Coronavirus. This is creating significant cash flow challenges for hospitals and health systems.

As you can imagine, telehealth services are in great demand. As a result of the public health emergency declared under Governor Evers' Executive Order 72, certain temporary and permanent changes have been made to telehealth policy. Wisconsin Medicaid will now allow remote services utilizing real time technology to include audio-only phone communication for services

that can be delivered with the "functional equivalency" of face-to-face service. Recent concerns for individual privacy under the HIPPA Act and its penalties have been set aside during the COVID-19 public health emergency. Providers may use any non-public facing remote communication product but may not use public-facing applications like Facebook.

Permanent policy changes to telehealth policy include individual mental health and substance abuse practitioner services in settings other than those certified by the Department of Quality Assurance may be reimbursed for telehealth services. Further, individual practitioners of mental health and substance abuse not practicing in a facility certified by the Division of Quality Assurance may also be reimbursed for telehealth services.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services have provided federal support for the above telehealth benefits by expanding this benefit on a temporary and emergency basis under the 1135 Waiver of Authority and Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act. Prior to this waiver, Medicare could only pay for telehealth on a limited basis.

Despite the challenges Wisconsin hospitals, health systems and health care providers face during this COVID-19 pandemic, they are doing their best to serve all patients. I know when you have the opportunity, you will express your thanks and appreciation.

Summer must be just around the corner because plans have started for Rainbow's End Day Camp in July. Each year we look for exceptional youth volunteers to pair with campers with special needs to assist them with various activities like games, swimming, art projects and many more fun activities. This year's camp runs July 20-24 and July 27-31. The camp will be held at the Boy Scouts of America camp located on Camp Phillips Road in Weston. Volunteers must be at least 14 years old. Apply online at aspirus.org/volunteers. For those entering their senior year of high school, hours volunteered at Rainbow's End Camp will count toward the hourly requirement to be eligible for an Aspirus Volunteer scholarship.
