Mercy Medical Center Makes Changes to Auxiliary

October 4, 2010 marked another milestone in the evolution of the Volunteer Program at Mercy Medical Center in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

Inspired by a workshop at the 2009 Partners of WHA Convention, the auxiliary leadership recommended a strategic planning process. The sessions included hospital staff and auxiliary and non-auxiliary volunteers, male and female. This group recommended an evolution of the auxiliary structure to include all volunteers. A Volunteer Advisory Board, consisting of previous auxiliary leadership and other volunteers, will guide and grow the volunteer program, while continuing and expanding the work of the auxiliary.

Being An Effective Grassroots Advocate

Top 10 Tips from WHA HEAT Grassroots Director Jenny Boese

You may be surprised to hear that the vast majority of Americans never contact their legislators on issues. You can become someone who is speaking up on issues of importance to your community hospital by first, joining the Wisconsin Hospital Association's free grassroots advocacy program, HEAT (Hospitals Education & Advocacy Team), and second, keeping these "Top 10" tips in mind when contacting elected officials:

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- 1. The district matters Legislators want to hear from their constituents only. Constituents are the ones who vote for them and legislators need to be responsive above all others to them.
- **2. Being a resource matters** When hearing from constituents on issues, legislators want to know the following things: How does the issue impact my district; How does the issue impact my constituent personally?
- 3. Real life examples matter If legislation directly impacts your hospital, your family, your community or you, then tell your legislators how. These real-life examples help your legislator to understand the direct impact issues have on their constituents and community.
- 4. Personalizing your message matters When writing or emailing legislators, make sure to personalize your communication. Form letters or postcards are ineffective. Your legislator wants to know you cared enough about an issue to make your communication thoughtful and personalized.
- **5. Manners matter** Whenever you're writing, talking, or meeting with your legislators, please don't threaten them or be discourteous. We are all passionate about our issues but you will not help your cause by being aggressive in your communications and interactions with legislators.
- 6. The opposition matters Remember, there are always at least two sides to an issue and your legislator will likely hear all of them. Offering your legislator information, insight, facts, and examples of how the legislation will affect you helps your cause in the long run.
- 7. Credibility matters Legislators will remember (in a negative way) those individuals who fabricate or are unable to substantiate their position. Don't be that individual. Legislators rely on individuals they respect and find credible.
- 8. Relationships matter Developing relationships with your legislators is important. You can do so by writing thoughtful letters and emails, attending listening sessions, attending WHA's Advocacy Day, and more. Though it takes time, building relationships is vitally important.
- **9. Being patient matters** Affecting policy change can take time. In fact, compromise is the essence of our democratic process, so stick with it.
- 10. Your voice matters As I always say, if you're not the one shaping the future for your hospital, your patients, and your community... someone else is. Your voice matters, so make sure you speak up! Join WHA's free Hospitals Education & Advocacy Team (HEAT) today and speak up on behalf of your hospital and community. who wears hats. I have worked in the health field my entire career. Partners is a great organization with so many gifted wonderful volunteers and I thank Mark for offering me the CHE position.

This year, Partners' community health education focus will be on diabetes. What is diabetes? What causes diabetes? My hope is that you will understand diabetes, especially type 2. About 90 percent of all people with diabetes in the United States will have type 2 diabetes. That means that 24 million Americans have diabetes and one-quarter of them do not know they have it according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The chilling numbers on diabetes reported by the CDC is that 1 in 3 Americans could have diabetes by the year 2050.

Managing diabetes will always mean working closely with your physician and/ or a diabetes educator. However, diabetes demands that you take charge of your own care.

My challenge to each Partners organization is to have a diabetes educator speak at a meeting. Even if you don't have diabetes, there is someone you know or love that has the disease. A little knowhow goes a long way, and even small lifestyle changes can make a big difference.

Public Policy Education Report

I am honored to have been appointed to the position of public policy education chair for Partners of WHA, Inc. by President Mark Schaefer. I look forward to this challenge and to meeting you during the Spring Tour!

On November 2, 2010, Wisconsin became one of the only states in the nation to see a complete reversal of the legislative majorities, as Republicans wrested control of both the State Assembly and the State Senate from the Democrats. A full 29% of the Legislature is new.

The Republicans will control the Wisconsin State Senate by a 19-14 majority and the Republicans took control of the Wisconsin State Assembly 60 - 38 - 1.

In the U. S. Senate, incumbent Russ Feingold lost his re-election bid to Republican Ron Johnson. In the U.S. House, incumbent Steve Kagen lost his re-election bid to Republican Reed Ribble. Republican Sean Duffy defeated Julie Lassa for the open Obey seat.

These newly-elected Legislators mean new Grassroots opportunities for you! These freshman legislators need to know their respective hospitals and how they serve their communities. Invite them to tour your hospital, spend a day with your Partners group or a day shadowing your hospital CEO (WHA instituted a grassroots initiative called "Shadow Days" in 2009).

Legislative Issues on the Horizon

There are two priority issues WHA will be advocating on:

- 1. Federal Health Reform Implementation Republicans coming into office at the state and national level have indicated either a desire to slow down or outright repeal federal health reform. At the state level, Governor Scott Walker indicates one of his first actions will be to authorize Attorney General J.B. Van Hollen to sign onto the federal health reform lawsuit currently pending. WHA is and will continue to be engaged on major reform provisions such as the state's creation of a health insurance exchange.
- 2. Biennial Budget/Medicaid Gov. Walker and the Republicans are preparing for the daunting challenge of addressing the state's nearly \$3 billion budget deficit. The budget for the next two years will be introduced by Gov. Walker in February.

A component of this fiscal challenge will be Wisconsin's Medicaid budget. Many states throughout the nation are struggling with growing Medicaid populations and costs; however, Wisconsin stands out—in 2009 enrollment grew by an additional 21.5 percent, the second highest in the country and nearly triple the national average of that year.

WHA is actively engaged with the new Republican leadership to help guide those discussions as they pertain to priority hospital issues.

Grassroots Advocacy

Be the most effective grassroots advocate by becoming a HEAT member! The vast majority of Americans never contact their legislators on issues. As HEAT members, you will be someone who is involved in the legislative process. The challenge I issue to you is to have each member of your volunteer group become a HEAT member!

Last year the Wisconsin Hospital Association's grassroots network, Hospitals Education & Advocacy Team (HEAT) helped garner millions in Medicaid dollars for Wisconsin Hospitals!

In 2006, the therapy program won the Partners WAVE Award. Erik stole the show at the 2006 WHA Convention at Lake Geneva.

In 2009, a young patient at St. Mary's Hospital was seriously ill and her only request was to have Erik lie by her side, which he did for about 30 minutes. This was his last therapy visit to the hospital, two days before he died.

Now a painting was made from a photo of the patient, and Erik is on display in a main

hallway of the hospital. St. Mary's now has 25 teams giving therapy visits to its many patients.
