PUBLIC POLICY

As always, there is a lot happening on the political scene. Budgets are being drawn up on both the state and federal level. Republicans in the state legislature have rejected the budget proposed by Governor Evers and are writing their own budget. Evers has hinted he may veto the entire budget. Complicating things is the monies allocated within the CARES act and the AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN. Some of the federal dollars have specific ways in which they can be spent. Things to watch that are of particular interest – How mental health monies are allocated, dollars for broad band and funding for disproportionate share hospitals. I expect health care will do "OK" in this budget as COVID concerns are still in the forefront. Watch for HEAT alerts asking you to contact legislators about budget issues.

President Biden has submitted an ambitious budget with a large price tag. He proposes funding it with a tax increase on the wealthy and corporations along with borrowing. Republicans are opposed to any roll back of tax cuts or increases in taxes. Hopefully a bipartisan agreement can be reached.

Two words we hear often in the news are filibuster and reconciliation. Here is a short review on how they work. The filibuster is not defined in the constitution. It was established by Senate rule in the early 1800's. The Senate, as the Upper House, was not designed to be a site of majority rule but a place of deliberation and reflection where the rights of the minority would be protected. The filibuster is essentially unlimited debate. The longest filibuster lasted over 24hours. A procedure known as Cloture is used to end a filibuster. The Senate leader calls for unanimous consent to end debate. If anyone objects, a vote is taken. Sixty votes are needed to end the filibuster. It the vote is less than 60, the bill is considered "filibustered", debate is closed and the bill is not voted on. Nominations for executive posts, federal judgeships and a few other special cases are not subject to filibuster.

Reconciliation is a process that can be used to pass budgetary legislation affecting spending, revenues and the federal debt limit. It can only be used once per year on each subject. Reconciliation bills only need a simple majority to pass, they are not able to be filibustered. The "BYRD" rule prohibits reconciliation bills from increasing the federal deficit after 10 years, or making changes to Social Security. The Senate Parliamentarian determines if the bill meets the criteria needed to be passed via reconciliation. The Vice President can override the Parliamentarian, but that is very rarely done.

At the moment I am writing this it's the second week of June and most of the Community Garden plots have been planted. Our 9th season marks the 4th time that we've had all 24 plots reserved. Although we lose a gardener or two each year, we've been blessed by newcomers joining us each year as well. This year we welcome a team of gardeners from the Rotary Club, three new donor gardeners, a master gardener, and two new gardeners growing for their own tables.

Our gardeners continue to enjoy their work with the Community Garden program. We are out in the fresh air, working with our hands, and making a difference in the fight against hunger in Chippewa County.

With every plot being reserved we have the potential for our most productive year ever!

Many thanks to Don Wester, Manager of Tractor Central for providing the tilling of our plots again this year. With a brand

new tractor and mulcher at the dealership he sent one of his employees to the garden and prepped designated plots for us.

One of our plots this year has a totally unique look -Plot 1B is populated with four raised planting beds. This experiment was made possible by my need to replace my deck at home and the deck boards, railings and other components were used to create the raised beds. The "free" lumber was used to build each of the planters about 30" wide by 8 feet long and at a height of about 17" - perfect for sitting down on the edge of the planters for planting and weeding. Loey and I don't do hands and knees work very well any more, nor do we tolerate stooping to any extent so we felt the raised beds would be an opportunity to allow us to continue gardening, but in greater comfort. The experiment is off to a good start - the planting and watering went well. It'll be interesting to see how productive these planters can be.

Our beekeepers, Don Hauser and Richard O'Mara, along with volunteer helpers Rick Beckler and Janine Albrecht have re-populated our bee community and they're busy every day, making honey.

Once again we have been blessed with opportunities to share our story within the community. Both Channel 13 and Channel 18 broadcast interviews with me and Cathy, and several of our new members came to us as a result of that exposure.

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Gardeners get to have the wildlife in the area keep us company each season - the turkeys have been strutting their stuff in the open field, the eagle from the nest on the Northern Center grounds soars overhead, the bluebirds are back in town and we've recently been visited by a few Monarch butterflies.

Community Garden season 9 is off to a great start! God is great! Every day in every way. the "Green Beanie"...

TICKS, TICKS, AND MORE TICKS!

Ehrlichiosis is an illness spread by ticks, most commonly the lone star and blacklegged tick. Anyone can get this illness but people who spend more time in the outdoors are at a higher risk. Ticks are most active from May to September and found in the woods, brushes, and tall grass. However, we need to be cautious throughout the year as well. This disease is spread through the bite of a tick. Ticks need to be removed as soon as found to prevent illness. They can attach to any part of the body but often found in hard to see areas such as an armpit, belly buttons, scalp, in and around the ears, groin area and behind the knees


Ehrlichiosis is preventable and treatable. Signs and symptoms are usually mild. Early signs and symptoms can be fever, chills, severe headache, muscle aches nausea, vomiting, joint pain and rash.

This disease is treated with an antibiotic and should be started as soon as Ehrlichiosis is suspected. Delay in treatment can be extremely dangerous leading to damage to the brain or nervous system, respiratory failure, uncontrolled bleeding, organ failure and even death.

If you are unable to remove a tick or start to see a rash, please consult your physician right away!
