2016 Advocacy Day

A number of staff and volunteers from Mercy Medical Center, St. Elizabeth Hospital, and Calumet Medical Center headed to Madison via an Affinity sponsored motor coach on March 30, 2016 to attend the Wisconsin Hospital Association's (WHA) Advocacy Day. Advocacy Day is an annual event that connects hospital supporters from across the state with their legislators in Madison so lawmakers can learn how issues impact local hospitals and communities.

The crowd of over 1,000 heard from the morning's keynote speaker, Rick Pollack, the President and CEO of the American Hospital Association as well as a bipartisan state legislative panel. Governor Walker provided luncheon keynote remarks and signed important WHA legislation - the Wisconsin Health Care Data Modernization Act - into law.

After lunch, attendees made their way to the State Capital for meetings with their elected officials. Advocates made sure their legislatures were aware of the role hospitals play in communities across the state in providing high quality, high value health care and how the legislature can support those efforts through the policies it enacts.

Adjusting your Attitude for More Success

Stanford researchers are making the case that attitude is more important than IQ. Good news: Attitude is easier to change! Start with understanding your "mindset." Either you have a mindset that is "fixed" or your mindset is "growth-oriented," says researcher, Carol Dweck, Ph.D. A fixed mindset means you're not very open to change or willing to adapt to it. You don't view mistakes as opportunities or stepping-stones to your success. People with a growth mindset do. (Think Thomas Edison-he kept trying hundreds of times before the bulb finally glowed.) Embrace challenges, persist in the face of setbacks, see effort as the path to mastery, and learn from criticism to achieve an open mindset. How well do you identify with these critical elements of a successful mindset?

Project SEARCH is coming to Mercy Medical Center in the fall of 2016

Project SEARCH is a high school transition program; a unique, business led, one year school-to-work program that takes place entirely at the workplace. The focus is on helping youth with disabilities make successful transitions from school to adult life. Mercy Medical Center and Franciscan Courts will be the worksite for the project partnering with the Oshkosh Area School District, Goodwill Industries, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation and other agency support services for the benefit of the interns. In addition to learning employability skills in an onsite classroom setting, the interns will be available five days a week when school is in session to provide service for about 4 hours per day within hospital departments such as Environmental Services, Birthplace, Surgical Services, Food and Nutrition Services, Outpatient Behavioral Health, Patient Care Units One and Two, the Mercy Health Foundation and the Nursing, Maintenance and Dietary departments at Franciscan Courts. 

Volunteering is Good for Your Mind and Body

Volunteering provides many benefits to both mental and physical health:

* Volunteering increases self-confidence. Volunteering can provide a healthy boost to your self-confidence, self-esteem, and life satisfaction. Studies have found that, even considering health factors, those who volunteer have a lower mortality rate than those who do not. Volunteering has also been shown to lessen symptoms of chronic pain or heart disease.

Endowment: A Lasting Impact



Endowment giving is a time-tested way to expand and increase the impact of your life or the life of someone you love through charitable giving. An endowment is a fund established in perpetuity to provide annual investment income to support a specific program, department or initiative. Examples of endowment fund opportunities at Mercy include establishing a scholarship fund; supporting critical programs like PEACE (People Exercising after Cancer

Enters) for cancer patients or the Fitness for the Physically Challenged program for those with a disability; or designating specific departments such as Volunteer Services or Spiritual Services.

Endowments can be established during a person's lifetime, or through a planned gift with a minimum pledge or contribution of \$10,000. The fund then grows over time, with a percentage of earnings used on an annual basis for the purpose of which the fund is determined. Endowment funds provide you comfort in knowing exactly how your donation will be used, now and into the future.
