# Report of the Community Health Information Presentation made by Diane Roekle Partners Meeting on February 9, 2018

About 75 million Americans (32%) have high blood pressure. This translates into 1 in every 3 adults. Only about half of people with high blood pressure have their condition under control. Another 30% are not aware that they have high blood pressure.

High blood pressure (*Hypertension*) is often called the "silent killer" as there are usually no symptoms until organ damage develops or your pressure is dangerously high. It is a serious condition that increases your risk of stroke, heart attack and kidney disease.

Common symptoms of high blood pressure include: headaches, shortness of breath, chest pains, nose bleeds, visual problems and dizziness.

Low blood pressure is a less common problem. It can occur at any age. Some people naturally have low blood pressure and experience no symptoms while others may have dizziness, fainting or lightheadedness.

Typically, low blood pressure is caused by another problem such as dehydration, sudden blood loss or a side effect of a medication. Treatment of low blood pressure is dependent on its cause.

Medical experts define low blood pressure as readings lower than 90 mm Hg systolic or 60 mm Hg diastolic.

Blood pressure is measured in millimeters of mercury (mm Hg) and recorded with the systolic number first, followed by the diastolic number. For example, a normal blood pressure would be recorded as around 120/80 mm Hg.

The systolic number is peak pressure while the heart is pumping blood into the body while the diastolic number is the pressure of the heart at rest. The higher the blood pressure rises, the harder the heart needs to work.

There are four categories of blood pressure. It is important of know the category that applies to you in order to maintain your health.

#### WHAT CAN YOU DO?

First, monitor your blood pressure. If your pressure is normal or prehypertension, maintain your healthy lifestyle, control your weight and exercise.

For stage 1 and 2 hypertensions, seek a physician's recommendations. You may need to adjust your diet, establish an exercise program and/or use medications to lower your blood pressure.
