Ascension Branding Updates



Project SEARCH is a school-to-work program that takes place entirely at the work place. Ascension Mercy Hospital was recognized on October 12, 2017 by Office of the Governor with the "Wisconsin Exemplary Employer Award" for hosting Project SEARCH in Oshkosh at Ascension Mercy and Franciscan Courts and for employing those with disabilities.

The focus of Project SEARCH is on helping youth with disabilities make successful transitions from school to adult life. Ascension Mercy and Franciscan Courts partner with the Oshkosh Area School District, Goodwill Industries, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation and other agency support services for the benefit of the interns.

Of the twelve interns from last year's group, eleven are currently employed. Ascension Mercy hired one of last year's graduates and Franciscan Courts hired one as well.

The second class of Interns for the 2017-18 school year started their first job rotations this fall. Interns assist in the areas of PCU 1, PCU 2, Birthplace, Environmental Services, Food and Nutrition Services, Outpatient Behavioral Health, Maintenance and the Foundation at Ascension Mercy. At Franciscan Courts they are helping in the areas of Nursing, Environmental Services, Dietary and Maintenance.

Caregiver Background Checks - For Your Information

The following message is from Ascension Human Resource Operations regarding the Wisconsin Caregiver Background Check law.

In compliance with the state and federal equal rights laws and the state caregiver background check law, Ascension conducts caregiver background checks on existing volunteers at least every four years. Ascension will consider volunteer criminal arrest and conviction records in complying with statutory requirements. A history of criminal conviction will not automatically eliminate a person from consideration for volunteering with the organization. Ascension will evaluate the conviction record in light of the requirements of state and federal laws. In addition to criminal background checks, the organization will conduct other background checks as required by law.

All in facility volunteers are required to notify the Volunteer Services department in regards to changes related to any of the items listed below. The notification must be in writing and forwarded as soon as possible, but no later than the next working day:

- * Convictions of any crime
- * Substantiated findings of abuse, neglect or misappropriation
- * Current investigations related to abuse, neglect or misappropriation
- * Professional credential restrictions, limitations, or revocations
- * Program licensure limitations, revocations or denials
- * Discharged from any branch of the US Armed Forces, including any reserve component; residency outside the state of Wisconsin
- * Rehabilitation review requests

Winter Safety Tips from Your Safety Team



During winter weather, we want you to be safe not only while you're volunteering but while you're on your way to and from volunteering so plan ahead using the following safety tips. Watch your step! Be sure you wear appropriate footwear to get safely from your vehicle to your work site across potentially slippery parking lots.

If you have a cell phone be sure it is well charged and within reach. Program your department phone number into the phone so it is handy to call in if you'll be late.

If the roads are treacherous, we don't want you on them. Call volunteer services if you are not able to come in due to road conditions. Think slow in snow while driving!

To be prepared in the event of an emergency, it's good to keep a vehicle safety tool kit with the following items in your car: a shovel, windshield scraper, jumper cables, tow chains, warm clothing/blanket and gloves, high energy food, candles, flashlight with extra batteries, and matches or a lighter.

A friendly reminder when parking at Ascension Mercy Hospital - please do not park in the North/ER lot unless you have a handicapped parking permit or are parking in a white lined space. The yellow lined spaces are reserved for patients.

Health Care Legislative Update

Senate leaders recently announced that a bipartisan agreement had been reached to continue funding the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). The announcement of this bipartisan agreement is a significant step in the process to ensure that kids will have access to coverage through CHIP. Congressional leaders will be working to move this agreement on policy into formal language for a bill. As the legislative process moves forward, we will continue to monitor and add Ascension's voice as appropriate.

Ascension Wisconsin was part of a coalition made up of hospitals and associations across the State urging our elected officials to find a solution for CHIP funding quickly. We are glad the bipartisan work on the Senate side has resulted in a policy agreement.

Below are some additional points about CHIP for reference:

- CHIP provides affordable, comprehensive health coverage to nearly 9 million children.
- As of FY 2016, 8.9 million children were enrolled in CHIP, and as of FY 2015, CHIP provided coverage to 4,200 pregnant women.
- In FY 2013, approximately 89% of CHIP enrollees were in families with incomes at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and 97% were at or below 250% FPL.
- Since the enactment of CHIP, the uninsured rate of children age 0-17 fell from 13.9% in 1997 to 4.5% in 2015.
- Children covered by CHIP are healthier than children without insurance who have more unmet health needs.
- Children enrolled in CHIP are more likely to have a reliable source of health and dental care and to have regular well-child visits.
- Furthermore, most CHIP-covered children receive coverage for audiology exams and hearing aids.
