Dr. Henry Ashe Continuing Education Scholarships

In December, the Volunteers of Howard Young Medical Center awarded five \$2,000 Dr. Henry Ashe Continuing Education Scholarships to Lakeland area college students enrolled in health care related fields. An awards presentation and reception was held at Howard Young Medical Center for the scholarship recipients and their families. This year, a change has been made that eliminates the restriction that recipients be enrolled at the undergraduate level. This will extend the scholarship availability to students pursuing an advanced degree in a health care related field.

The Volunteers of Howard Young Medical Center awarded a total of \$15,000 in educational scholarships in 2019. In addition to the Dr. Henry Ashe Continuing Education Scholarships, two \$1500 scholarships were awarded in June to LUHS graduating seniors, and two \$1000 scholarships were awarded to non-traditional students attending Nicolet College. All recipients must be pursuing a degree in a health care related field.

Over the last seven years, the Volunteers of Howard Young Medical Center have provided \$139,000 in scholarships to college students, LUHS area graduating seniors, and non-traditional students enrolled at Nicolet College. Scholarships are awarded based on the number of qualified applicants and funds available for the program. Funds are provided thanks to sales at the Volunteer Gift Shop located in the hospital and proceeds from an annual fundraiser, the Great Trivia Quest, held in October. 

Community Health and Education, Submitted by Joan Hauer, CHE Chair

There are a number of legislative changes in process, community planning efforts, and events planned to improve the climate for better mental health in the state and the northwoods. Representative John Nygren, Marinette, has worked to craft and shepherd legislation in the area of addiction since 2014. His daughter struggled for many years with addiction, an experience he shared publicly. A current effort would allow prescriptions without prior authorization of insurance companies who have agreed to this practice. It will save lives by not delaying potential treatment. It is a commitment from the insurance companies and others to make changes; no

legislation required. The insurance companies in agreement include Security, Anthem Blue Cross and WPS, among others. Delays have resulted in people lapsing back into use, so removing this barrier of time and paperwork will help. This would include medications such as Narcan, that reverse overdose effects and are life saving. Under another proposal, county jails would have easier access and training to use Narcan, which can rapidly reverse an opioid episode.

For anyone interested in the topic of eating disorders, a conference sponsored by Koller Mental Health is scheduled for May 8th at Lake of the Torches Conference Center. It will feature a nationally known speaker, Jenni Schaefer and is open to professional and interested community persons.

The NAMI support and education program continues to meet in the area; open to individuals and family members. Check the website for specifics. There are programs of family education and a drop in center in Rhinelander. As a NAMI participant said; "Be kind to past versions of yourself that didn't know things you know now."

Oneida County continues to collect drugs and provide disposal at four permanent sites throughout the county. Vilas county has a take back device at the sheriff's department. Take back days are also scheduled a few times a year and well publicized. The next one is April 25th. On that day, landfills will also accept medication to be discarded.
