Greetings from the MMCV Chair

Last fall, at the Partners of (Wisconsin Hospital Association) WHA Convention, I attended a session regarding organ donation. Michaela Layton told us her emotional story about her gift of life. She rarely got sick, so when she didn't feel well, she thought she had the flu. Blood tests proved otherwise by revealing Wilson's disease which is a rare genetic condition that causes copper to build up in the liver. She was admitted to intensive care and needed a liver transplant within days to survive. Thankfully, she received that new liver and a second chance at life. Michaela's donor was a young Illinois man who was killed in a car crash. His organs saved eight lives and his tissues were used to help many others.

Many of us have organ donor stickers on our driver's license but may not realize how important and lifesaving organ donation is. People of all ages can register to be an organ donor. Last year, 35% of donors were over the age of 50.

Registering is easy. Some methods are: designation on driver's license; registering on the Wisconsin state donor registry web site https://health.wisconsin.gov/donorRegistry/public/donate.html; sign and carry a donor card; informing your family of your wish to be a donor or updating your living will and having a designated power of attorney for healthcare. Once you register as a donor, you have made a record in accordance with Wisconsin state law. There is no cost to donors for tissue donation.

Volunteers are some of the most compassionate individuals and I hope you will consider being an organ donor. Currently, nearly 124,000 individuals in the U.S. are waiting for this gift of life.

Congratulations to Mercy Medical Center for earning the *University of Wisconsin Organ and Tissue Donation* (*UW OTD*) 2015 Family Care Award. The Family Care Award recognizes the comprehensive work of **one hospital** each year that exemplifies the highest standards of family support during an organ donation case. So hat's off to the Mercy Staff involved in Organ Donation!

Whether maintenance worker, physician, housekeeper, nurse, pharmacist, receptionist, social worker, therapist, patient care tech, volunteer, etc., we are the patient experience and we can transform the ordinary into the extraordinary by bringing together these key ingredients to create an exceptional patient experience.

74.4% of residents engage in "informal" volunteering such as in helping a neighbor.

Dress Code Reminder

Shirts worn with your volunteer vest should be professional looking - (no sweatshirts, screen printed t-shirts, athletic wear or sleeveless) attire.


