## **Breast Care Comes to Stoughton**

If you, or someone you know, has faced a diagnosis of breast cancer, you are well aware of the multitude of feelings one experiences. In addition to the trepidation and anxiety, the thought of having to travel outside of your community for treatment can cause additional stress. Stoughton Hospital is hoping to ease some of that anxiety by offering breast care services from mammograms to postsurgical care right here in Stoughton!

Dr. Aaron Schwaab and his team have created a new Breast Care Program that enhances the hospital's services of screening, biopsy and diagnosis. An experienced general surgeon, Dr. Schwaab treated hundreds of breast cancer patients during his eight years as Medical Director of the Centegra Breast Program in Crystal Lake, Illinois. Here in Stoughton, Dr. Schwaab is collaborating with a team of plastic surgeons to offer full service plastic and reconstructive surgery, along with tumor removal.

In addition to Stoughton Hospital's postsurgical care, including lymphedema monitoring and physical therapy, Partners of Stoughton Hospital is donating "Knitted Knockers" to women who have undergone mastectomies or other procedures involving the breast. Unlike traditional breast prosthetics which can be expensive, heavy, hot, and uncomfortable, Knitted Knockers are soft and pliable. There is no need for special bras or camisoles with pockets which sometimes can't be worn for weeks after surgery.



Partners volunteer, **Doris Burdick** has begun knitting the first Knitted Knockers. Our goal is to provide them at no cost to any woman who requests them.

Call 608-873-2281 to volunteer to help with this service project. Partners has also established the *Wigs for Patients* program to help women dealing with medical hair loss. The Wigs for Patients program offers high-quality wigs, at a reduced cost to patients in need. A patient can receive a one-time discount of up to \$80 for a wig.
